In all its schools, Thinking Schools' seeks to harness cognitive education and metacognition to create highly effective thinking and learning communities. Thinking Schools Academy Trust's cognitive approach to education has helped to drive improvement across all its schools. This success of this approach was demonstrated earlier this month, when the Trust was ranked by the Government as the highest performing academy Trust in the South East for GCSE results.

Schools within the Trust work towards achieving Thinking School Accreditation from the University of Exeter. 10 of the 17 schools within the Trust are currently accredited as Thinking Schools, with three of these having achieved Advanced Thinking School accreditation.

One of the three schools who hold advanced accreditation is The Portsmouth Academy who took the opportunity to announce to staff and celebrated during World Thinking Day that they had achieved their advanced status as well.

# THE PORTSMOUTH ACADEMY **RECOGNISED AS ADVANCED** THINKING SCHOOL

Students and staff at the Portsmouth Academy (TPA) are celebrating the Academy's accreditation as an "Advanced Thinking School" by the University of Exeter.

The Academy, which is part of our high-performing Thinking Schools Academy Trust, is one of only seven schools in the country to receive the prestigious Level 2 "Advanced Thinking School" accreditation.

The report by the University of Exeter's Graduate School of Education, issued as part of the accreditation process, noted that attainment has "steadily increased" at TPA, since its initial accreditation as a Thinking School – demonstrating the positive impact of its cognitive approach to education.

The Portsmouth Academy was rated Outstanding for effectiveness of leadership and management and Good overall by Ofsted in 2017, was previously accredited as a Level 1 "Thinking School" in 2016.

Our Trust is a family of 17 high-performing schools with hubs in Portsmouth, Medway and Kent, which pioneers an innovative "Thinking School" approach to develop students' cognitive skills and learning habits.

10 of the 17 schools within the Trust are currently accredited as "Thinking Schools", with three of these having achieved "Advanced Thinking School" accreditation.



### The University of Exeter's report highlights a wide range of other strengths, including:

- "A strong programme of staff development is in place throughout the school, which is rooted in the Thinking School ethos."
- "Students are confident in using the Thinking Tools effectively to help scaffold their own learning."
- "Thinking Skills are fully embedded in the school's teaching and learning ethos, which is clearly visible in the standard of student work."
- The Academy has "extensive links with other schools in the Trust, as well as with the Portsmouth Teaching School Alliance".

"I am hugely proud that the efforts of all our staff, pupils, parents, governors and wider community have been recognised. I would like to thank everyone for their hard work and dedication, which has played an integral role in our journey to becoming an Advanced Thinking School and we will continue to push for even greater heights."

World Book Day, a charity event held annually in the United Kingdom and Ireland on the first Thursday in March, was an opportunity for schools throughout the nationally recognised high-performing Trust, to celebrate and take part in creative activities and indulge in a world of imagination and reality through printed words leading them on a journey of discovery.

From Kent to Portsmouth, pages were turning as pupils and teachers swapped books and shared stories, where staff read extracts from books that made them fall in love with reading.

Many schools' pupils and staff dressed up as fictional and non-fictional characters, taking part in fancy dress competitions and parades. Mr Still and Mr Claessens, teachers at Holcombe Grammar School, dressed in their Where's Wally costumes to promote the Where's Wally 10K charity run for the National Literacy Trust that they will be taking part in. Pupils at Holcombe looked at biographies of aspirational figures and took inspiration from their stories. Cedar Children's Academy and Meredith Infant School wore cosy pyjamas while reading bedtime stories, with Meredith pupils coming in after school to enjoy a cup of hot chocolate while they listened and read.

All Faiths Children's Academy held a 'Read for Good' sponsored readathon where during the day the bell rang four times and the whole schools stopped to read a book for 20 minutes. Older pupils also buddied up to read to their younger peers. Sponsorship money raised will help children in hospitals to gain access to books while 20 percent of the amount raised will provide new books for the school.

Newbridge Junior School worked on a project where each class wrote a paragraph that followed on from previous paragraphs, with pupils having the opportunity to introduce twists and turns along the way. A magnificent story where nobody would know the outcome until the final paragraph was complete. Many schools had lessons where pupils developed their writing skills by creating their own pieces of written work.

Activities included building themed displays, quizzes, bookmark creating, book cover and spine design competitions, and an extreme reading photo challenge where pupils took photos of themselves in unusual or exciting locations and a scavenger hunt in the library, looking for books with particular words in their titles.

The Portsmouth Academy had a Harry Potter themed day, with Hogwarts styled lessons. English had Defense against the Dark Arts, Science got creative with potions and RE had Muggle studies to name a few.

Pupils received £1 World Book Day tokens to exchange for one of twelve special £1 World Book Day books or used as a discount voucher for a full priced book.

# TWO 'GOOD' TO BE TRUE



#### All Faiths Children's Academy in Strood, Rochester has been rated Outstanding for Personal Development and Good overall by Ofsted in a glowing inspection report.

Ofsted praised the academy, sponsored by the high-performing Thinking Schools Academy Trust, for its efforts to enhance pupils' personal development, though an "ambitious", "rich and diverse curriculum". The inspectors highlighted the wide range of opportunities provided for pupils to learn about the world around them and how to become responsible citizens.

In its report, Ofsted noted that the "culture of high expectations" set by the headteacher and leadership team, as part of the academy and Trust's wider commitment to "transforming life chances for all pupils", is helping pupils to succeed.

The academy was described as a "highly inclusive" and "happy, safe place to be", with Ofsted also praising the academy's "particularly strong" provision for pupils with special educational needs and/or disabilities.

The inspectors also noted that children "do well" during their time in the academy's Early Years provision, benefiting from a well-planned curriculum and nurturing environment where they "explore new things confidently and curiously".

The inspectors also highlighted teachers' "strong subject knowledge", noting that senior leaders and the Trust have provided them with appropriate training and support.

#### Cormac Murphy, Headteacher, All Faiths Children's Academy said:

"We are delighted with the outcome of the recent Ofsted inspection. We are particularly proud to see the inspectors recognising the strength of Personal Development, rating the academy Outstanding in this area. Ofsted also acknowledges how the high expectations we set all our pupils are helping to develop them into confident thinkers and learners, able to thrive in the next steps of their education."





Isambard Brunel Junior School has been rated as Good by Ofsted for the first time in over 20 years – with inspectors hailing the "significant" improvements achieved by the academy.

Isambard Brunel Junior School was praised for the quality of education pupils receive, the strength of leadership, and the behaviour and attitude of the children. Every area assessed by Ofsted was graded as Good.

There was particular praise for the Headteacher, Lucy Carroll, and her deputy, who inspectors said were "a very strong and effective team" who have "huge ambitions" for what pupils can achieve.

Ofsted also highlighted the strength of the teaching staff, including achieving rapid improvements in reading, writing and mathematics. Inspectors said that pupils behave well and "really make the most of all the great opportunities they are given to enrich their learning".

Thinking Schools Academy Trust began its sponsorship of Isambard Brunel Junior School five years ago and has steadily improved it, culminating in Ofsted's report. Ofsted praised the the support the academy has received from the Thinking Schools for the "significant" progress made since the last inspection.

Lucy Carroll, Headteacher of Isambard Brunel Junior School, in North End, said: "I am so proud to be the Headteacher of Isambard Brunel Junior School. I feel very privileged to work alongside such an amazing, hard-working and committed team and to be part of the lives of our incredible pupils and families. I would like to thank everyone for their continuous belief and support in us and our journey."

The reports underlines how the Trust's ethos of 'Thinking about Thinking' benefits pupils, with teachers encouraging them to use their "thinking skills to think deeply about the knowledge they acquire, for example by 'thinking globally' and 'thinking healthily'".

Stuart Gardner, Chief Executive of the Thinking Schools Academy Trust, said: "The work that has been done by everyone involved with the Isambard Brunel Junior School, and which has been led by Lucy, has been phenomenal. It is so rewarding to see that hard work pay off.

"The fantastic result for All Faiths is a real testament to the hard work and dedication of all involved to ensuring that the academy is place where all children thrive and succeed. It's great to see these efforts paying off and delivering such strong results.

"I would like to pay tribute to both Lucy, Cormac and their teams, to the pupils for their talent and hard work, and to the parents and carers who have always been so supportive."

# NEW HORIZONS CHILDREN'S ACADEMY PRAISED BY MINISTER OF STATE FOR SCHOOL STANDARDS

Pupils and staff at New Horizons Children's Academy are celebrating after being praised by Rt Hon Nick Gibb, Minister of State for School Standards, in a letter to the school's Headteacher Jody Murphy.

The letter congratulated Jody, staff and pupils for the high levels of progress demonstrated by pupils in last year's Key Stage 2 assessments. The Academy, which is part of the high-performing Thinking Schools Academy Trust, achieved progress scores of 7.6, 2.8 and 6.5 in reading, writing and mathematics respectively.

The letter highlighted these results stating that the levels of progress made by pupils at New Horizon between Key Stage 1 and the end of Key Stage 2 is in the top three per cent of primary schools nationally.

Additionally, an impressive 88 per cent of pupils at the Academy, achieved at least the expected standard in all three subjects – significantly above the national average of 65 per cent. This was the school's first cohort of pupils to take the tests, also known as SATs.
