WELCOME MESSAGE FROM OUR CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

Welcome to the 19th edition of Our Trust! Firstly, I am delighted to welcome several new schools to our Trust. Brixham College is a popular secondary school based in Torbay and



is the third school in the South West to join our family of schools. We also opened our doors for the first time at our new Secondary Free School in Medway – The Maritime Academy. I was really pleased to see our vision of

through education coming to the fore with many of the new Year 7's having transitioned from our local Trust Primary schools. Finally, we also launched our new Penbridge School in Portsmouth which brought together Penhale Infant School and Newbridge Junior School.

This summer we returned to the familiar routines of formal public assessments and examinations and I think it is worth recognising how well our students responded to this challenge. Across our schools, students achieved some outstanding results from Year 6 to Year 13 enabling them to move successfully onto the next step of their life journey. These comments from our students sum up how the examinations went: "It's incredible," Emily said, "I'm most proud of my English results because I successfully revised." "The teachers have been so supportive all the way through these difficult years," Layla said.

With the return to formal public examinations I reflected on how different this process of examinations was to the Teacher Assessments that had taken place during the pandemic. For me, one of the greatest educational steps forward during the pandemic was the implicit use of a criteria-based assessment system for allocating student grades on the basis of what they could do, rather than on the basis of where their score in an exam ranked compared to their peers. I suggested to one of our previous Education Ministers that this was a golden opportunity to reframe our model of

assessment and move away from the obsession that only a certain percentage of students can ever "pass" – wouldn't it be better for us to aspire for everyone to achieve proficiency in English and Maths rather than requiring X% to fail year after year? Unfortunately, I am not sure such a radical change to public policy is on the horizon, however, as expert educators we should be open to challenging the status quo and considering if there is a better way of supporting our young people to Transform their Life Chances.

In addition, the increased emphasis and reporting of outcomes has reinforced my belief that our vision of delivering a wide breath of experiences for our students through our focus on Total Education is the right one. Whilst achieving their personal best in academic qualifications is an important element of a child's journey through school, it is only part of the growth and development required for them to reach their full potential. You only have to leaf through the pages of Our Trust to see our commitment to the holistic development of our students from the amazing whole Trust TSArTs project to Muddy Madness at Cedar. This year we will be starting to measure the impact of our Total Education offer so that we can continue to develop and enhance this provision for our students. 

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Secondary Schools across the Thinking Schools Academy Trust celebrate their students as they receive their exam results.

This summer marked the first set of 'sat' exam results for GCSEs, IB and A-Levels since the start of the pandemic. The departing cohorts encountered countless disruptions over the last few years with school closures, staff and student absences and changes to the examination processes to name just a few. Throughout this time the students across our Trust have shown great resilience and determination in their studies which has brought them to this moment – A moment to celebrate all the brilliant personal achievements of our young people.

The Thinking Schools Academy Trust now has nine secondary schools located across the south of England. On 6th July, Rochester Grammar School

in Medway received their IB Diploma Programme results. The school offers the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme as an alternative to A-Levels as it is designed to prepare students for university. Through the programme, students' study three higher subjects and three standard subjects across a range of disciplines, including languages, maths, sciences, humanities and the arts. They also complete a Theory of Knowledge course, an Extended Essay and 150 hours of Creativity, Activity, Service (CAS). CAS covers non-academic activities such as volunteering, learning new skills and community projects.

This year, the students excelled themselves, achieving a high average point score of 35, scoring over the

international average of 32 out of 45. Principal Clare Brinklow said "I am so thrilled for this year group of students who have achieved such amazing results against the backdrop of such a turbulent few years. These students did not sit their GCSEs due to the pandemic and had to work through partial school closures and further lockdowns during Year 12, but they have embraced the IB Diploma and all of the exciting opportunities it brings."

Following on from this celebration, on 18th August, Holcombe Grammar School, The Victory Academy and Goodwin Academy in Kent and Plymouth High School for Girls and Plympton Academy in Plymouth, received their A-Level Results.

As with our IB students, these classes showed great tenacity when facing disruption to their education and achieved some fantastic results despite these challenges!

Our schools saw success in a range of subjects, with many seeing over 80% of students achieving A*- C grades, or equivalent.

Goodwin Student Maisie finished the year with three distinctions and reflected "I feel very proud of my achievements, I have been fully supported through my time at Goodwin. The teachers have been brilliant and I have really enjoyed my education at Goodwin. I am excited about the next chapter in my life." While Molly from The Victory Academy, cried tears of joy at her results, thrilled to be continuing her studies at Canterbury Christchurch University, studying Biology with the hope to return to Victory to teach Science in the future.

Many of our A-Level students are now progressing on to their chosen universities to study a variety of subjects, such as Dentistry, Natural Sciences, Psychology, Nursing, Criminology, Ocean Exploration and Surveying, Business Management, Teaching, Sports Coaching, Economics, Politics, Law and many more. Others are moving on to apprenticeships or fulltime employment in varying fields or taking gap years between their studies. Simon Underdown, Headteacher at Plymouth High School for Girls

complemented the cohort, saying "I am delighted for our year 13 students, they have shown resilience and determination in the face of significant challenges. This was the year group that missed out on being in school for the last part of their GCSE courses, yet they approached their A levels with maturity and dedication."


The celebrations did not stop there though, as the following week saw more accolades come through as all secondary schools received their GCSE results. On 25th August, students across the country visited their schools to find out their grades, after being the first year of students to physically sit the exams since 2019.

It's been inspiring to see young people persevere through unforeseen circumstances and achieve their desired grades and ambitions. The schools reflected that students have worked tirelessly to make excellent progress and have truly excelled themselves. They should feel extremely proud of their achievements.

Further to the results day, the Portsmouth Academy said goodbye to their first cohort of boys who completed their studies after joining the school five years ago when it became co-educational. Robin, who made history as the school's very first Head Boy, said he was sad to be leaving but is excited for what the future holds. Leavers praised the staff for their continued support

and positivity, thanking the school for their help over the last five years.

Our students now prepare to take that next step in their education by staying on for Sixth Form or attending college or embarking on an apprenticeship. Their possibilities are endless.

Headteacher retires after almost 40 years in the job

A much-loved city headteacher has retired after more than 37 years of transforming the life chances of children at Meon Infant School in Milton, Portsmouth.

Karen Morey, who joined Meon on probation (now recognised as an ECT) in September 1985, says the school community caught her heart from day one - which has been the reason why the school has been her first and only place to teach.

She said: "I'm excited about retirement, but it's mixed with a tinge of sadness as I am part of a community here. I will miss the children, the staff, and the parents because I do feel that I am part of Milton.

"I feel honoured and quite blessed to be part of this community. I have loved this school for so long, which is one of the reasons I didn't move."

Mrs Morey started at the school in Reception and went on to serve other year groups, before becoming Deputy Head, and Acting Head this past year.

Karen said: "At Meon, it's such a family school. There were lots of other people who stayed here for a long time as well. We were a family within the staff and the community. It has been a nurturing school.

"I have taught lots of the parents of the children that come to school, and often at the beginning when I was in the classroom. I would ask the children whose mums, dads, aunties and uncles I have taught, and many of them would raise their hand."

Karen's journey at the school began in April 1985, when she applied to work in education for Hampshire County Council.

Back then, those in education wouldn't apply for a particular school, as the council managed education for the area.

The county asked whether Karen was okay to work in either Southampton or Portsmouth, and she was happy with both, which led her to joining Meon Infant School.

She said: "On my first day, I thought I had to go out and buy a new lipstick because I felt too young so I needed a new lipstick to make me feel a little bit grown up."

Asked about her biggest learning throughout her time at Meon Infant School, Karen said: "An Ofsted inspector approached me once to say that I love children. I was taken aback as I thought everybody in education loves children.

"The inspector said, but you have a particularly wonderful love for children... and that's just me. I'd say to anyone in education to always be very children first with a constant focus on seeing children being happy and flourish... that's what I have learnt."

Meon Infants is sited next door to Meon Junior School, also part of TSAT, and from September, Meon Junior HT, Sara Paine will step up to become Executive Headteacher of both schools.

Holcombe students have something to say







The Holcombe Student Representatives had a busy few weeks at the end of the Summer Term, participating in several conferences within the Trust and the local, Medway area.

On 27th June, representatives from the school took part in the inaugural TSA Trust Student Leadership Conference. The conference virtually brings together students from Years 5, 10 and 12 representing their schools across our Trust, providing students with the opportunity to collaborate with their peers from schools they may not work with often. The representatives

teamed up to discuss issues that are common to young people, focusing on Equality and Diversity, Charity and Wellbeing, Student Magazine and the Student's Council. They found the experience to be informative and inspiring, coming away from the event with new ideas they wish to implement in the new year.

The second TSA Trust Student Leadership Conference took place on 11th July and was called 'Earth Alliance'. The Earth Alliance Conference was hosted by Plymouth High School for Girls with keynote speaker, Dr Daley from the University of Plymouth. The main focus of the event was to answer "Why schools need student leaders on environmental issues and why

it's important to maintain a focus on reducing our impact on our environment." Plymouth High introduced their Earth Alliance team to the schools in attendance. The conference gave students the time to reflect on a number of topics in workshops chaired by members of the Earth Alliance team. Topics covered included; Smart Meters, Planters, Clean our Patch, Zero to landfill and Earth Alliance Student Leadership across the Trust.

The Holcombe representatives used this opportunity to express their views on the impact climate change has on our planet. The students commented on the event, saying;

"I found the conference very useful and impactful. 'There is more plastic in the ocean than stars in the milky way,' was the boldest statement from the conference. I learnt that smart meters are being installed and our school should have one to make a difference in our energy usage." - Henry Stephens, Year 10 Student Representative.

Raza Haisnain, another Year 10 Student Representative said "My favourite part of the meeting was learning about the wildlife and the trees and how we have affected them as it made me aware of this ongoing issue and want to help these things. Specifically, the facts like only 4% of animals are actually free animals and that over half of the trees have been cut down."

The Holcombe Student Representatives didn't stop there though, leaving the classroom and stepping out into the community, they attended the Medway Youth Council Conference on 7th July. Holcombe was represented by Finn Dewanne from Year 8, Tolywanimi Williams from Year 9 and Henry Stephens from Year 10. The group discussed issues around the topic of 'Poverty – The impact on young people' and were noted to have represented our school very well

Hot wheels: Plymouth High Hummingbird Team are through to the finals!

We are thrilled to share that our Plymouth High School Hummingbird team won both races in the SW Formula 24 heats as well as the Sustainable Award, securing them a place in the Goodwood final later this year.

On Wednesday 15th June 2022, 14 teams from across the southwest pitted their skills against each other during the race at the navy's Predannack Airfield, on the Lizard Peninsula in Cornwall, assisted by engineers from nearby RNAS Culdrose.

The weight and shape of the car are factors the crew must consider, with the drivers laying as low as possible to

ensure Hummingbird stayed sleek and that they drove the car as smoothly as possible.

The engineering team took immense care to guarantee that no material was loose, that the components were aligned and functioned properly, and that anything that could flap around was perfectly nailed down.

The track conditions must be carefully evaluated, and the novice drivers, along with the experienced pit and performance staff, must judge how fast they can go while using the least amount of energy when negotiating the corners, as well as the most effective manner to overtake their competition.



Communication among all teams is critical to the Hummingbirds' success, and this race was no exception.

Jess, the school's new driver, achieved the fastest lap, navigating the 0.8mile circuit in 44 seconds! Incredible!

This racecourse relied heavily on Hummingbird's ability to race on various surface conditions. When designing Hummingbird, PHSG engineers and the design team kept this in mind. As a former airport, the circuit was significantly bumpier than planned, giving Hummingbird the advantage and allowing them to win both races.

Thinking School Accreditations

Schools rejoice as they celebrate being awarded several fantastic achievements!

New Horizons Children's Academy had a whirlwind final term. Before breaking up for the summer, the school took some time to celebrate many brilliant achievements including retaining their 'Good' rating from their recent Ofsted inspection and gaining their Artsmark Gold Award. What's more the Trust celebrated a double win as both New Horizons Children's Academy and The Victory Academy became accredited as Advanced Thinking Schools!

The University of Exeter's Thinking Schools @ Exeter leads the way in research in Metacognition, Thinking Skills, Creativity and Dialogue in Education - providing a structure for schools to become recognised Thinking Schools. The Victory Academy was accredited as a Level 1 Thinking School in 2018. It was identified as a "school with a clear vision of the attributes that it wants all children to develop and is relentless in its pursuit of this vision." New Horizons Children's Academy was accredited as a Thinking School in 2017 and was the

first school in Kent to gain additional accreditation through the SEND Inclusion Award in 2019, "These achievements reflect the



school's drive for sustained holistic development, together with an unwavering commitment to lifelong learning for all."

In order to achieve Level 2 Thinking accreditation to become an Advanced Thinking School, the academies were assessed on; Dissemination of Practice, Evaluative

Research, Professional Development, Differentiation, and Whole School Assessment. These areas identify the school's continued work to support lifelong learning and holistic growth for all students. Both schools have fully embedded Thinking Skills into their teaching, assessment,

evaluation, and staff development which was recognised throughout the reports. The University of Exeter documented, "It is clear that The Victory Academy has an exceptional commitment to its continued development as a Thinking School, both in terms of ethos and pedagogy. [...] there are effective strategies in place across subject areas that encourage and support evaluation and reflective practice of learning and teaching approaches and impact."

Principal of The Victory Academy, Michelle Smith, says "The staff at The Victory Academy work tirelessly to transform the life chances of our students, support their progress and develop their thinking. I couldn't be prouder that the University of Exeter's School of Education recognises our commitment to our young people and awarded us the Advanced Thinking School Accreditation. Thank you to everyone involved who worked so hard to achieve this award."



New Horizons was praised for providing additional work on a national level, supporting schools across Plymouth and Portsmouth, and running a number of workshops at Trust conferences. The school "is working with the Assistant Head of a school in China on using meta-cognitive language aligned to Thinking Tools" and have recently been part of a "research group for a new book on Retrieval Practice." The University of Exeter states, "There is a clear and effective programme of dissemination across the whole multiacademy, the Thinking Schools network, regionally, nationally, and internationally which includes contributions to conferences and publications."

Cormac Murphy, Principal of New Horizons Children's Academy, says, "I am thrilled to have our commitment to the development of staff and students at New Horizons recognised by the University of Exeter. TPA Q+A

Meet the teachers supporting students' great achievements using the Microsoft Reading Progress app...

Teachers from The Portsmouth Academy have helped increase the average reading age for some Year 7 pupils by more than 5 months after they introduced the Microsoft **Reading Progress app into** everyday literacy.

Chiara Fraser, Liv Fox, and Sam Devoil were recognised for their reading revolution at the **Teach Portsmouth Awards** earlier this year after receiving the Innovation in **Teaching Award. Thinking** Creative spoke to the team on what it is all about, and their big plans...

Why did you win the Innovation in Teaching Award?

The award recognises the work we have done around literacy, to improve the average reading age for students within the school, with the Microsoft Reading Progress tool on their digital One:One devices.

As a Thinking School, we know that as our society and community move forward, we must move forward with them. Part of the One:One overhaul - where every student in Years 7 and 8 receives a laptop to

support their learning – is to encourage accessibility around for every student, so can then learning for our students. So, the three of us thought let us improve literacy by using these devices.

We won the award due to our ability to use Microsoft applications on our One:One devices to make literacy more accessible to our students.

How has the Microsoft Reading Progress tool helped students at the school?

The Microsoft Reading Progress app enables us to upload various pieces of text that the students can engage with using their One:One device.

But what is fantastic, is we can adapt how students – such as those with an accent or a certain dialect – can engage with the reading.

When the students are reading aloud to the app, it can show how many pauses they make, the intonations they have, the mispronunciations they speak and their speed.

It tracks when they stumble over words, their pauses, fluency, and everything else to do with reading aloud.

Staff can then log onto the

app and see the app's report support them even further.

You can film and record yourself through this app too, which will provide you with a percentage score out of 100 and provide you with a breakdown of what to do differently to improve.

How has the Microsoft Reading app changed how you teach?

One example of how the app has changed how we teach is that it has allowed us to quickly find the most common and complex words for a whole class.

If, for example, a student is reading aloud to the app and stumbles on a challenging word, if that happens consistently across the class then we can address that and get everyone's ability aligned.

Are you only using the app in English?

No. When you think about developing your literacy, so many people categorise it into English lessons, but that is not right.

Literacy is used in every subject, so we are hoping to use the Microsoft Reading Progress tool in as many

subjects as possible. In the 2022/2023 academic year, we are rolling this reading progress app out into history, geography, and science. Students' homework across these subjects will incorporate the app too so that the young people are consistently improving.

What is next for you?

Now that we have a firm grasp on Microsoft's Reading Progress feature, we are planning to roll that out across the whole of Key Stage Three [Years 7, 8 and 9] and eventually school wide. Alongside that, we will introduce Microsoft Reading Coach to the students too. Reading Coach will build on what students have achieved in the Reading Progress app by showing the 5 words each student struggled with the most and presenting them again with the tools to support them in practising independently.

The tools available can include text-to-speech, syllable

breaking, and a picture dictionary. We will be able to customise how it is delivered, so pupils can have a learning experience that is bespoke to their needs which will hugely support their progress.

How have you worked with Microsoft on the roll out of these apps?

We have learnt so much from Microsoft and continue to learn too. We are on a journey with using these apps to help students here at The Portsmouth Academy. We heard about this around six months before it was released, so we have been very privileged to work in partnership with Microsoft to have the success stories we see and hear today.

How do you feel as professionals in education seeing the Microsoft Reading Progress App positively playing a part in transforming life chances?

It is a proud moment to see students engaged and openminded about this tool. It is sometimes a bit of a struggle for them to take literacy seriously, or to care about it, but they have received the app well and it is encouraging to see a difference is already being made.

It is all about accessibility here. Young people cannot see and understand their world without being able to read. That is not just about reading information but reading culture. We live in such a multicultural place, in Portsmouth, so it is amazing so many of our students can now engage with this tool and improve their reading.





All Faiths finish the year on a high with three TSAT Rocks win under their belt

Last year, junior school students across the Trust battled it out to be crowned TSAT Rocks Champions. Times Tables Rockstars is an enjoyable and interactive tool, helping children across the country learn and practice their times tables. During the TSAT Rocks tournament, our junior school students compete against each other to become Top of the Rocks and take home the TSAT Rocks trophy.

Our students have been taking part in the termly tournaments since December 2021, with each tournament seeing over 1,500 children getting involved across 96 classes in 7 schools, including; All Faiths Children's Academy, Cedar Children's Academy, Gordon Children's Academy and New Horizons Children's Academy in Medway and New Horizons Primary School, Meon Junior School and Newbridge Junior School in Portsmouth.

Every tournament gets bigger and better with our final battle seeing a phenomenal 1,617,552 questions answered, breaking the previous record. This is due to the sheer hard work and determination of our students, who should all be extremely proud of what they have achieved this year.



All seven schools involved have done an incredible job competing over the months, but a special mention must go to All Faiths Children's Academy for winning a fantastic 3 out of 5 tournaments! As a oneform entry school, this is an incredible achievement which both the staff and students are thrilled to celebrate!

Jody Murphy, Director of Education, said: "It's been wonderful to see students from both Medway and Portsmouth taking part in the TSAT Rocks competition and





improving their times tables in a fun and competitive way. As always, this couldn't be possible without the support from the Maths leaders in our Primary Schools as well as teachers and parents. Congratulations to everyone who took part in all of our competitions – we look forward to a new year of battles and welcoming a new cohort of students taking part!"





Within the Summer Term, the academy sent a group of Year 12 Sports Leaders and Year 10 BTEC Sport students to provide legacy of the Birmingham assistance at the Kingsdown Primary School Summer Cup. Taking place on 5th July, all primary schools in the area are invited to take part. The students from Goodwin helped in running the events, /setting up each activity, / assisting pupils, starting the races and giving out the awards. The Headteacher and sports coaches from Kingsdown Primary Schoo

could not praise our students more highly. All students involved were a true credit to our school and the PE Department.

Goodwin Academy also had groups of students from Year 9 and 10 visit Parochial Primary School and Hornbeam Primary School to support with their sports day events. Similarly to Kingsdown, the feedback from the primaries was glowing and the pupils, once again, did the school proud. Goodwin Academy always looks for ways to connect with the community and thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity to work closely with the infant and junior schools in the area.

This Summer, the

organisers strategy for the
legacy of the Birmingham
Commonwealth Games 2022,
SGOs across the county
organised several

Commonwealth Sport events alongside community clubs to ensure "a lasting legacy" of the games. – Introducing the Goodwin Try'athlon, spelt this way to coincide with the aim to encourage people to have a 'try' at new sports.

Phase one of the Try'athlon was run as a school house competition in a relay format. Each house completed 30 lengths in Dover Leisure swimming pool, with a pupil from each house and form completing 750 metres, a 20km cycle, which took place in the fitness suite and a 5km run around the academy field.

Staff were on site to monitor lengths swam and distance travelled throughout the race. Alongside this, Mrs Cribben, a teacher at Goodwin Academy, raced in a local triathlon for the first time, raising money for Macmillan Cancer Support. Collectively between the Try'athlon and Mrs Cribben's fundraising, the school raised a combined sum over £1,000.

Following on from this, students from Years 7, 8 and 9 participated in the Try'athlon - "A Birmingham Commonwealth Legacy" in July. The event aimed to engage Key Stage 3 students who may not have access to community clubs or events like this in their everyday lives.

The event took place at The Duke of Yorks in Dover. where our students had to complete a 100 metre swim, followed by a 4 Kilometre cycle and finish on a 1.5 kilometre run. They really challenged themselves and completed the race through sheer perseverance and resilience. It was wonderful to see how proud they were for completing all three activities and only had positive feedback from the experience. They commented on how much they enjoyed the opportunity to complete a new individual challenge. Each student was awarded with a T-shirt, medal and certificate for their efforts.

Over in Medway, Rochester **Grammar School encountered** a number of brilliant sporting successes this year, leading them to achieve the School Games Gold Mark Award for the 2021/2022 academic year. The School Games Mark is a Government-led award scheme launched in 2012, facilitated by the Youth Sport Trust, to reward and recognise school's engagement in the School Games against a national benchmark and to celebrate keeping young people active.

Rochester Grammar is a big supporter of celebrating their students' successes in sports both within school and as extracurricular interests. The school praised many of their students' sporting achievements throughout the year, including Scarlett, who was a runner up in football with Kent at the National County Championships against Stoke City FC and awarded top goal scorer of the season.

In June the school's Year 7
Cricket team competed in the Medway SSG Cricket
Competition, finishing in second place, while the Year 7 super 8s athletics team placed 5th overall in the Medway Secondary School Games competition.

When they're not taking part, the students assist in competitions in many other ways. In June, a number of sports leaders umpired and scored at the Medway Sport MYG Kwik Cricket competition at High Halstow CC. Throughout the day their confidence grew and they were a great representation of the school.


