Three schools celebrate progress in their Artsmark journeys

Holcombe Grammar, The Gordon Children's Academy and Penbridge Junior School within the Thinking Schools Academy Trust have achieved the prestigious Artsmark Award.

Artsmark is the only creative quality standard for schools and education settings accredited by Arts Council England.

Artsmark supports schools to develop and celebrate arts and cultural education, putting creativity and wellbeing at the heart of the curriculum, as well as ensuring every young person can be creative and access a diverse, high-quality cultural education.

In February 2024, both Holcombe Grammar School and The Gordon Children's Academy gained the prestigious Silver Award, the first step of the Artsmark journey.

To achieve their award, Holcombe raised awareness of arts, culture and creativity amongst their students and staff by focusing



on increasing exposure to arts and cultural experiences within the school's daily tutor periods.

This was praised by the Artsmark assessors stating: "this is great as it involves staff from across all departments."

The school recently refurbished their main hall, opened a new drama studio and installed a new professional lighting and sound system, which allowed them to reintroduce Drama at a Key Stage 3 level and for GCSE. These changes have seen an increased number of students taking up drama as an option.

Nichola Miles, one of the staff leads on this campaign, reflected on the experience, saying: "The Artsmark journey has awakened





Holcombe's creativity and talent. Enabling us to embrace our unique community and culture has been exhilarating.

"Our students have become inspired and motivated to learn artistically, with the freedom to express themselves. The outcomes have far surpassed our expectations."

Within their report, The Gordon Children's Academy were praised for "the start of good pupil voice work with Arts Ambassadors" and it was recognised how "Engaging with the arts is having tangible results on pupils, staff and parental connections. Arts and culture feature in school planning, are supported by SLT and newly refined Art, DT, Music and Drama curriculums."

Meanwhile, in Portsmouth, Penbridge Junior School were praised for their creativity as they were awarded the outstanding Artsmark Gold Award, which the school achieved by developing a broad and ambitious curriculum. The Artsmark assessor commended the school, saying: "The school use their links with their [Portsmouth] music hub to enhance the music curriculum. They have supported teachers to build their knowledge and confidence in teaching across Key Stage 1 and 2.

"Teacher expertise and confidence has been increased through the new schemes of work and clarity on the progression of skills being taught. In house CPD has been provided in staff meetings and by outside agencies and hubs. Teachers have observed artists working with their classes."

Claire Young, music lead at Penbridge, said: "This Artsmark Gold award is confirmation of all the good work that we're doing across the school, really promoting the arts in music and in artwork, dance and drama. Applying for Artsmark has really brought the importance of the Arts to our attention, so we have been focused on achieving this over the last couple of years."







South West schools celebrate 'Good' Ofsted result in all areas

Two South West schools have been praised by Ofsted for their positive work to offer an ambitious curriculum and benefit the lives of their pupils.

Lodestar Academy and Curledge Street Academy, which are both based in Paignton, Devon, are 'Good' schools following their inspections.

For Lodestar Academy, the first Alternative Provision school within the Thinking Schools Academy Trust, they celebrated an improvement in their Ofsted rating, progressing from 'Requires Improvement' in 2020 to 'Good' across all areas.

Highlights from the report included praise for the academy's warm and welcoming community atmosphere, stating: "The welfare of pupils and their families is at the heart of the Lodestar Academy [...] Pupils get the care and support they need to overcome challenges. They receive individual guidance to help them learn."

Pastoral support was also recognised in the report, which said: "The school offers excellent pastoral support to pupils and their families" and stated that "there is a nurturing environment for pupils to learn."

Ofsted also commended the academy's curriculum, stating: "School leaders ensure the environment is well resourced and looked after [...] This helps pupils have the same learning experiences as those in mainstream schools."

Lodestar Academy was also praised for the career guidance and support given to pupils to ensure they are well prepared for their next steps. "They do not put a ceiling on pupils' aspirations. Pupils successfully go on to college, university, or secure an apprenticeship," said the inspector. Steven Hulme, Headteacher at Lodestar Academy, said: "We firmly believe in challenging the misconceptions that surround Alternative Provision. Lodestar Academy is not defined by limitations but rather by opportunities, innovation and success. We are so proud that we are defying Alternative Provision stereotypes and empowering our students for future success."

Elsewhere within the same region, Curledge Street Academy was praised for its nurturing culture and high expectations for all pupils.

Within their report, the inspector stated: "This aspirational culture is embedded across the school, and as a result, leaders and teachers work together effectively to teach a broad and ambitious curriculum."

One of the standout features of the report for Curledge Street Academy is the overwhelming sense of pride expressed by their pupils.

The inspectors noted that the school motto, 'Be safe, be kind, be ready,' serves as a guiding principle for pupils, shaping their behaviour and interactions and creating a respectful and harmonious atmosphere throughout the school.

Ofsted also commended the curriculum, adding: "Pupils in the early years get off to a flying start. The school is acutely aware of the importance of developing pupils' communication and language. As a result, the curriculum in the early years is deliberately designed to enrich children's knowledge of words." 'Aspirational culture is embedded across the school, and as a result, leaders and teachers work together effectively to teach a broad and ambitious curriculum.'

Jessica Humphrey, Executive Headteacher of Curledge Street Academy, said: "This achievement is a testament to the hard work and dedication of our incredible staff, the enthusiasm of our pupils, and the unwavering support from our parents, community, and The Thinking Schools Academy Trust. Together, we have created a positive and nurturing environment where learning flourishes."

Our all-through education is Transforming Life Chances

The concept of an all-through education system is gaining increasing recognition and popularity. But what does it actually mean and why does it matter?

An all-through education system, as the name suggests, provides a continuous educational journey for pupils from early years through to secondary education – and in some cases, Sixth Form education - all under one roof.

This approach recognises that education goes beyond the confines of textbooks and exams; it encompasses the development of the whole individual, equipping them with the skills, knowledge and values needed to thrive in an ever-changing world. At the Thinking Schools Academy Trust, we are unique in our focus and delivery of teaching; we share the tools with pupils to become lifelong learners, and to develop the best possible habits for success in life.

Two schools within the Thinking Schools Academy Trust have received their Thinking Schools accreditation for the first time.

The accolade, presented by the University of Exeter, recognises the school's unique and effective approach to learning and education, providing pupils with the skillset and tools needed to think in a variety of ways and become lifelong learners.

The use of **'Thinking Tools'** within lessons prepares the pupils for a range of situations that they may face as part of modern society, contributing to the Trust's focus to support every child in being their best selves.

Thinking Schools at Exeter leads the way in research in metacognition, thinking skills, creativity, and dialogue in education, providing a structure for schools to become recognised Thinking Schools.

Both Moorings Way Infant School in Portsmouth and Maritime Academy in Kent were recognised in October 2023, creating a rippling effect of celebration across two of our regions at the time.

For Moorings Way Infant School, they have worked hard to weave the Thinking framework into everyday life at the school, and this was recognised throughout the school's assessment and subsequent accreditation.

The University of Exeter said in their report: "The school has a prominent

and visible thinking culture, and this is due to the excellent organisational structure and visual presentation. Questioning for Enquiry is used daily in order to develop reflective communication skills. The excellent 'Be Your Best Self' (BYBS) reflective journal adds further to the reflection dimension."

"Thinking Hats are also used in order to reflect on behavioural aspects. These reflections are subsequently shared with teachers and parents. This ensures that the thinking partnership between the school and parents is strong. Indeed, parents are fully involved in their children's thinking successes."

Sara Paine, Executive Headteacher at Meon Way Federation, said: "I'm delighted Moorings Way Infant School has received their Thinking Schools accreditation, and I'm particularly pleased about the reports praise for our collaboration between all three Meon Way Schools and others from across our Trust."

Meanwhile, as a new school, Maritime Academy had the unique opportunity to embed Thinking at its core from conception, with a leadership team bringing years of experience of working within Thinking Schools



and "drawing upon years of Thinking School development across the Trust, leading to a seamless transition as the school has become established."

The report acknowledges that: "The integration with the Trust is exceptional such that it stands as a beacon of educational community provision. Staff and children think deeply about what they do, and levels of collaboration are exceptional."

The academy was thrilled to be recognised as a Thinking School within just one year of opening, with Assistant Principal Jimmy Carr, saying: "From day one, our vision was to implement thinking and metacognition into the classrooms and community to develop independent, reflective lifelong learners. The staff have been fantastic in embracing our thinking processes and tools to be child first in our approaches."

Black History Month 2023

Schools were asked to create a piece in any artistic format, be it illustration, written or video, celebrating the theme of 'Saluting Our Sisters'. We were thrilled to receive just under 300 entries! Our secondary school winner was Sara from Rochester Grammar School for the beautiful portrait of Rosa Parks, a renowned American activist in the civil rights movement, famous for her refusal to give up her seat on a bus.

Remembrance

Schools and staff from across the Thinking Schools Academy Trust united to mark Remembrance Day 2023 on Friday 10th November.

Remembrance Day is a memorial occasion, marked annually on 11th November with a two-minute silence held at 11 o'clock, commemorating the date and time the First World War ended.

This is the first year that we ran Remembrance Day as a WeAreOne event, uniting our schools to honour the fallen together. Together, following a video recording of the poem "In Flanders Field", read by our Trust's Director of Culture and Development, Mandy Gage, we stopped for a twominute silence at 11 o'clock, honouring those who have given their lives to fight for our freedom. We will remember them.

























Colchester Royal shines in Sister Act

Students from Colchester Royal Grammar School came together to produce an energetic performance of Sister Act.

Ella Harvey and Elodie Roper, students from Colchester Royal Grammar School (CRGS), were assigned the roles of co-producing the school's next musical. After much deliberation, it was decided that they would bring 'Sister Act' to the CRGS stage.

To support the production, a creative team was formed, consisting of two stage managers, two choreographers, a production manager, and a marketing manager. Together, with Ella and Elodie, they got to work right away.

The team worked tirelessly to pull the show together, making executive decisions about staging and costumes. They had found it difficult to source 20 nun costumes, so they had to hire them from a local company in Great Dunmow, Ella commented: "The effect was worth it, and by the end of the dress rehearsal, we were feeling delighted, hopeful, and excited about opening night." The show was a true hit, with teachers crediting it as "the best show CRGS has produced in the last 25 years." The co-producers reflected on the experience, saying: "We were so blessed to work with such a talented cast and crew who made the whole process such an enjoyable experience, and we hope they enjoyed it just as much as we did. 'quite nervous and like it could've been a long shot'.

Lacey is now flourishing on her course and exclaimed: "My time with The Victory Academy so far has been so positive. Never did I think I could love my job so much, and also be able to work as a part of a team who both respects me and also values the work I put in! Not only do I receive full support from the workplace for my studies, but also loads of support when it has come to personal issues and my wellbeing. I honestly couldn't think of a better way to start my career journey!"



Finding passion and joy for one's work is important in our aspirations for personal and professional success and Lacey's positive sentiment was echoed by Kat King and Ellie Green, who both work within our Thinking Personnel team. International Women's Day

Plympton Academy raises over £300 for local charity Trevi 'Enough' campaign supporting International Women's Day.

Their insightful discussions resonated deeply with Sixth Form students, sparking meaningful conversations about the importance of International Women's Day, and sharing inspirational stories of female empowerment and resilience.

These talks not only provided valuable insights but also served as a catalyst for positive change within the school community. Students were encouraged to reflect on the role they can play in promoting gender equality and standing up against discrimination and violence.

Additionally, Trevi delivered a compelling message about the 'Reclaim the Night' movement, stressing the urgency of addressing gender-based discrimination and violence while highlighting the critical need for safe spaces for women.



Under the guidance of staff, students were encouraged to express themselves through art, with a focus on producing meaningful placards that reflected the spirit of empowerment and advocacy.

These placards serve as powerful visual representations of students' thoughts, beliefs,

Rochester Grammar awarded top AfPE Quality Mark

The Rochester Grammar School (RGS) is overjoyed to have been awarded the highest accolade of the Association for Physical Education (AfPE) Quality Mark, gaining a Distinction during their validation visit.

The AfPE Quality Mark is a prestigious award that evidences the strength and quality of Physical Education, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) within a school.

With this achievement, RGS becomes the first school in the South-East to receive this award and one of only 17 schools nationally, including fellow Trust school, The Portsmouth Academy.

Leading on the campaign, Rochester Grammar's Curriculum Lead for PE, Vikki Bell, said: "My heart sank when the news headline came out that there had been a decline in enjoyment in PE for girls. RGS has 1,004 girls aged 11-16-years old with an additional mixed Sixth Form, and the buzz and engagement in PE, Sport, and Physical Activity defies the negative stigma that the media portrays."

Since joining the school two years ago, Vikki has worked with the PE Department to prepare for the rigorous self-review process and to ensure that the school is delivering the highest quality curriculum for all students to access and progress in. The department spent 24 months overhauling and creating a new PE curriculum







with the vision; "To ensure that every student is physically active, knowledge rich, and has a variety of opportunities for healthy participation in PE, Sport and Physical Activity."

Rochester Grammar believes it is important for students to access the "education" in Physical Education, so designed a curriculum that not only focused on the physical but embedded the knowledge and understanding for students to live happy, healthy futures by being physically active.

Their Student Voice was pivotal in developing the sporting opportunities offered and contributed to 100% of students participating and engaging in PE lessons. Attendance at extracurricular clubs, where students can consolidate their curriculum journey, continues to grow, with over 750 students participating in PE clubs in 2022-2023.

Vikki said: "The student voice meeting left me speechless with goosebumps. The passion and appreciation for PE within the school was clear to see, the positive impact on behaviour, attitudes, self-esteem, wellbeing, attendance and the confidence the students had talking about the subject made me beam with pride." Vikki said: 'The student voice meeting left me speechless with goosebumps.'

Discussing the process, Vikki said: "The Quality Mark process is not for the faint-hearted, it is for those that are willing to showcase what they have on offer and are able to react positively to constructive feedback. I would highly recommend the process to secondary schools, as it validates the hard work and commitment of a PE Department, as well as raises the profile of PE, Sport and Physical Activity.

"I am very proud to say, that we achieved the AfPE Quality Mark with Distinction! Our application was also sent to the Department for Education as a model of good practice – hopefully quashing the myth that girls do not enjoy PE!"

The Portsmouth Academy recognised nationally with 'Silver: Rights Aware' award

The Portsmouth Academy received the Rights Respecting School Silver accolade, which is presented by UNICEF UK when a school demonstrates an awareness for putting children's rights at the heart of school life.

To achieve the 'Silver: Rights Aware' status, the academy was assessed by one of UNICEF's advisors who looks at the whole school's rights respecting work.

"The language of rights is increasingly being used in daily school life:" the report said.

It added: "It was felt by many that knowledge of rights (at The Portsmouth Academy) was helping to improve safeguarding... pupils talked about the school's Report It button on the website which helps them to raise any issues, and they felt confident that staff would support them to resolve problems."

The Portsmouth Academy already held its Rights Respecting Schools Bronze status, but has provided evidence to achieve Silver, which will now be valid for three years as the school strives for Gold.

This award means that The Portsmouth Academy is explicitly embedding the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child in its policy, practice and culture, and that there is a plan to reflect this in teaching and learning to positively impact all.

The feedback received also stated: "Pupils spoken with felt that they are listened to at school. They reported that there are regular surveys for pupils and the Senior Student Leadership Team are involved in school improvement."



The academy is beginning to see the positive impact of these actions - a requirement to achieve Silver - on the children, staff, and on the school's ethos, practice and environment.

Ryan Lock, Assistant Principal for Personal Development at The Portsmouth Academy, said: "At The Portsmouth Academy, we believe that every child should be recognised, respected and protected, and that's exactly what the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child embodies."

A 'Gold' experience for New Horizons following Olympic athlete visit
